Dear Parents, Students, Staff and Friends of St Patrick's College,

Last week I watched a documentary on minimalism. This is not minimalism from an artistic perspective where the works of people like Stella, Judd and Flavin were discussed, or indeed where the compositions of Reich, Riley and Glass were played and analysed! While this in itself would have been interesting, the 1960s minimalist movement in the arts was not the point of the documentary. Rather, the documentary explored the philosophy of minimalism from the view of doing, desiring and owning less. The simplification of one's life was the thrust.

Four years ago we sold our large-ish home and moved to the smallest house we have lived in since we were first married. It is a very humble three bedroom, one bathroom home with only one living space. It would never make the pages of Home Beautiful. We sold all but one of our lounge suites, got rid of our big family dining table, gave away most of our books for someone else to enjoy and gifted most of our crockery and knick-knacks. I have never felt so free! We were simplifying our lives.

As human beings, we often suffer from the "accumulation of stuff" in our very lucky and wealthy country. I used to be very house proud and admit to being a bit of a neat freak. If my wife reads this she will certainly say this is an understatement. As I look at our lounge room now with its mis-matched and very lived-in furniture, I think I can say that it really doesn't matter to me anymore. My attachment to the stuff in our house has splendidly diminished. There is honestly not much that I possess that I am precious about.

Surely the people in our lives are far more important to us than anything we could ever own. People can't be replaced or upgraded and they are not "in" or "out" of fashion. Instead, they provide us with untold joy, love and a sense of belonging. Ok, there is frustration and disagreement at times also! I worry that sometimes we suffer from affluenza; where keeping up with the Joneses isn't aspirational but rather covetous, and where our glee comes from ostentatious displays of the outward trappings of wealth. How do you measure success in your life?

We must be careful as parents, to resist inculcating in our children a sense of "more being more" and "much is better." It is disappointing when young people are overly impressed by the brand of car you drive or the boat in the driveway or the postcode of your residence. This currency and kudos is often short-lived. Children listen acutely to pronouncements about "stuff", and sub-consciously develop an attachment that is sometimes unhelpful. Far better that the visit of a boy to your home as a friend of your son is marked by being impressed by the level of engagement, spirit and conversation. In my home our children's friends were always welcome to share a meal with us and to make memories by talking and laughing together. I can't remember what we ate, or the quality of the table or plates, but I do remember the time we spent with each other.



When my father died, it became very obvious to me that all of the stuff (which was mostly worthless in dollar terms) he had accumulated actually meant nothing. He couldn't take any of it with him. What riches we can amass as we build the Kingdom here on earth can only be about love of God, love of neighbour and love of self. As a school, we surely also need to add a love of

learning. My prayer for all of our boys this week is that they be blessed by less. As those famous minimalist artists and composers from the 1960s informed, an economy of materials and ideas can generate such immense product, purpose and aesthetic and aural beauty. Minimalism speaks to equity, sustainability and the sharing of our world's resources. Minimalism and frugality should however not be confused. Doing more with less is minimalistic, whereas frugality is concerned with spending less and being forced to make do. What we choose to have in our lives should provide us with meaning. Sometimes the very stuff that we desire to acquire turns out to be the guff that ties us up and imprisons us.

A number of staff had the opportunity to discuss aspects of our strategic plan with the Board with an emphasis on sharing our learning improvement efforts. The work we have been doing on assessment, student feedback and bringing our Learning Framework to life were key features of this engagement. We thank EREA for choosing to visit St Patrick's College.

Science and Engineering Challenge 2017

During the holidays, specifically on 27 June, a group of 18 boys from Years 9 and 10, teamed up to participate in the annual Science and Engineering Challenge run by the University of Newcastle. The challenge is a nationwide STEM outreach program, aimed at inspiring students to consider a future career in the respective Science and Engineering fields and to allow students to explore aspects of these industries, that they may not be exposed in the normal school environment. For the competition, we were divided into 8 groups and were each assigned an activity for either the full day, or two smaller, half-day activities. These ranged from pragmatic bridge constructions, engineered chairs and electrically powering cities, to building rovers for Mars and sending communications using fibre optic rods.

After many hours of dedication, hard work, theorising and developing prototypes, we regrouped and finished off the day by spectating the successes and fails involved with the testing of the bridges. After this final part of the event, our scores for the day were added up, and compared to the achievements of the other participating schools. Much to our content, the SPC team was ranked first overall, thus receiving the first-place plaque and an invitation to take part in the state finals event. After being declared the winners of the day, and the highest scoring school from two days' worth of competitions, we finished the challenge by walking out of the university, ready to take on the next round of the competition held later this year. Our clear improvement from the 3rd place certificate earned last year, has found us designing more prototypes such as planes and catapults in the subsequent state finals challenge.

On behalf of all the boys, I would like to thank Mrs Chander and Ms Benham for supervising on the day, taking time out of their holidays, to allow us to participate in the competition.



Year 12 Trial HSC Examinations—Year 12 begin their dress rehearsal for the HSC examinations next week on Monday 31 July and will conclude two weeks later on Monday 14 August. The Trial HSC timetable has been emailed to all students with a copy of examination rules and expectations.

Boys are reminded to thoroughly familiarise themselves with these documents as well as the College's Assessment Policy issued to the boys last year in fourth term. Ignorance of the College's Assessment Policy or examination rules will not constitute a valid excuse and penalties will be incurred for breaches of policy and procedures.

In particular, in the event of absenteeism due to illness or misadventure during the Trial HSC examinations, parents and boys are reminded that a telephone call to the Year Coordinator, Mr Castiglione, must be made prior to 9.00am on the day of the examination. Where possible, an alternate paper for the missed examination will be arranged within the Trial period. Immediately on the boy's return to school, a medical certificate for the illness or misadventure must be given to the relevant Studies Coordinator. I would like to wish all our Year 12 boys well for these very important examinations.

Years 7 to 10 Semester 1 Reports—By the end of this week, the Semester 1 Reports on students of Years 7 to 10 will be available online to parents via the Parent Portal on *SOLE*. It is important to note that only parent accounts will be able to access the reports. Parents who have forgotten their passwords can complete the "forgot password" link on the *SOLE* login page.

It is worth noting a few key features of the report include:

- a percentage *Course Mark* and *Course Average* for each course studied, based on cumulative assessment over the semester in accordance with the schedule of tasks and weights issued by the College;
- an A, B, C, D or E *Overall Achievement* grade referenced to the *Common Grade Scale* as defined by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA);
- a *Grade Distribution* in terms of the number of students awarded each A to E grade in a course;
- achievement in a number of learning outcomes expressed by a descriptor: *Excellent, Good, Satisfactory, Elementary or Limited*. Each descriptor relates to clearly defined standards of performance referenced to the *Common Grade Scale*.
- achievement in a number of class work practices, such as conduct and application.

The Course Mark represents the alignment of the raw cumulative assessment result to a standard 0 to 100 performance scale common across all subjects. Thus, a mark reported of say 75 in one subject has parity with that same mark in another subject. Additionally, the grade reported on that mark is the same across all subjects or courses and therefore in this case, a mark of 75 would fall into a Grade B range. It is important to note that the Overall Achievement grades and the Grade Distribution provide two kinds of information about the academic progress of students. The Overall Achievement grade gives an indication of academic performance relative to the achievement of course outcomes referenced to nationally defined standards and benchmarks. The Grade Distribution gives an indication of that performance compared with other students in the Year undertaking the course.

The issuing of the reports is an important time for parents to constructively assess their sons' academic progress and make the necessary adjustments for the second semester, with the view of making realistic and progressive improvements over time. The College will provide an opportunity for parents to discuss the Semester 1 Report with class teachers on the evening of Monday 14 August, 3.40pm to 6.30pm inclusive. These interviews are optional given that normal scheduled Parent/Teacher interviews were held last term. Parents may book interview times via the Parent Portal on *SOLE* by clicking on the *Edval PTN* button. The booking period will open on Monday 7 August and the cut-off deadline to make interview bookings is Thursday 10 August. If you have any questions relating to the booking process please contact Ms Belinda Angilletta at the College. I urge parents to keep the focus of these optional interviews on the Semester 1 Report. In particular, the interviews will not be an appropriate forum for parents of Year 10 to discuss prospective subject selections or enrolment in Year 11 with individual class teachers.

Year 11 2018 Parent Information Evening—The College will be hosting an Information Evening on Monday 31 July for all parents who have sons currently enrolled in Year 10. The aim of the evening is to provide information regarding the subject selection process members of the Year 10 cohort are about to undertake. Our venue is the College Gym and we will start at 7.00pm, concluding by 8.00pm. Year 10 students are not required as they will be involved in a Subject Market Day on Tuesday 1 August.
