





PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As the new Principal of St Patrick's College, I could not have received a warmer welcome by all members of this special community. The boys are honest, polite and forthright and I have enjoyed getting to know them and have been humbled by their willingness to share their lives with me. It was particularly special when our new Year 5 students commenced with us as these boys not only joined our community at the same time as me, but they will lead our College in its Centenary year. On their young shoulders rests a significant responsibility and honour and I look forward to getting to know them, and planning with them, for what the College will look like in its 100th year.

Prior to my appointment here, I held the role of Director of the Southern Region in the Archdiocese of Sydney, a portfolio that included 52 schools in the Southern and South Western areas of Sydney. Previous roles have included principalship of Domremy College, Five Dock and Bethany College, Hurstville. The last few years of the 18 years at Waverley College was as Deputy Headmaster (Curriculum). I feel honoured and blessed to be charged with the responsibility and opportunity to lead St Patrick's College.

Already it is evident that the College's success is built on a foundation of developing boys' 'heads, hearts and hands'; a holistic approach to meeting the educational needs of boys. We seek to develop in boys a strong sense of personal identity while empowering them to achieve personal excellence through authentic learning experiences. We aim to build their knowledge and skills in a safe and inclusive environment so they can be confident, capable and caring citizens.

During Term 1, work commenced on a new Strategic Plan for 2022-2025. The Plan will reflect the hopes, dreams, aspirations and views of staff, parents and students. Your efforts to complete the surveys are appreciated and I look forward to sharing the journey of strategic planning with you. Our new plan will further inform our College's mission, vision, values, goals, and objectives. The surveys enable stakeholders to voice and agree on the same priorities and focus on the same path to improvement. This insight helps our Executive team develop a more targeted plan and builds stronger community support.

As this publication goes to print, we are delighted to have gained approval to commence work on our new science/learning building on the site of the existing tennis courts. This magnificent structure will house state-of-the-art science laboratories, more general learning spaces, a new canteen and cafeteria, commercial and domestic kitchens, parking and new change and shower facilities for the boys. It will enable

us to expand the curriculum to include Food Technology and Commercial Cookery. At the same time, guided by the new Strategic Plan, we will develop a new Master Plan for the site, this time with a focus on the Merley Road end of our site (Gym, Pool and Duffy Centre).

In arriving at St Patrick's College, I have enjoyed reacquainting myself with an extensive co-curricular program which is an integral part of College life and is something that sets us, and similar schools, apart from most schools across the country. The College's primary co-curricular commitment lies in the sports and activities within the Independent Schools Association (ISA) competition. In addition, the College provides a number of sports and activities which run parallel to this competition including music, drama, debating, and Duke of Edinburgh.

A robust co-curricular program plays an important role in developing the knowledge, skills and attitudes young people need to adopt in an active lifestyle, where physical activity is a regular and valued part of their daily lives. Furthermore, students develop the ability to set goals and strategies, work as a team, win with dignity and look upon loss as an opportunity to improve. Co-curricular participation also provides students with additional leadership opportunities and improves their mental health and wellbeing.

I have been most impressed with the strong connection our Old Boys have to their College and overwhelmed by how many who have reached out to me via social media, during enrolment interviews and at various functions. A significant number send their sons to be educated here with second and even third generation students enrolled at the College. We are most fortunate to have Old Boys contribute to the College in various ways; some offer their coaching expertise or share their time and knowledge during events like the Careers Information Evening or by their presence on various College committees. Strong Old Boy involvement is a very special thing and one I will continue to support and nurture.

I am grateful that 2021 has commenced with minimal impact by the pandemic, and I look forward to being able to host our special events on-site with our wonderful parent community accompanying us.

All of this was based upon our acknowledgement of the traditional custodians of the land as we listened to local Darug language, and were inspired to go forth reflecting all that is good in the world to all whom we meet.

Following Mass, the whole community celebrated the academic achievements of the Class of 2020; the whole day bringing together our two great missions – faith and education.



The Edmund Rice Life Training Centre cares for young men in PNG who need to be able to learn skills to financially support their families and villages. Callan Services is about offering programs and support to people with disabilities in PNG where there is little to no government support for them. Our partners are a very important aspect of our College and the relationships we have is an indication of how we fulfill our mission as Christians to love and serve those around us.

Students at the College share the responsibility to do their part during this fundraising period; each contributing to their homeroom fundraisers which included food stalls, sport competitions or even video game tournaments. Collectively the SPC community has raised over \$75,000 for our partners.

The Lenten season is truly a fantastic way to see how much of an impact one community can make on the lives of others and it was wonderful to see all of the amazing work being done around the school for such an important cause.

HOLY WEEK LITURGY


On Wednesday 31 March, the St Patrick's College fraternity gathered around Breen Oval in order to celebrate the sacrifice and miracle of Easter as a College community. It was a perfect Autumn day with clear blue skies above and just a hint of wind in the air. The liturgy began with readings from Father Jack, Patrick Tandiono (Year 12), Vincent Younes (Year 12), Samuel Naccarella (Year 6) and Lucas Biscotto (Year 8). Each reading detailed the importance of Lent, Holy Week and the Resurrection of Jesus in the lives of the greater Christian community today.

Following on from the readings was the drama component of the Liturgy. Students from all year groups came together to reenact the 14 Stations of the Cross, with Jake Milligan of Year 11 playing the role of Jesus Christ. The 14 stations were set up in a semi-circle on Breen Oval, with each station consisting of a still picture of the scene. As Jesus moved throughout the stations, one person from each scene recited a few lines, outlining how they felt in this moment. Each station concluded with a short prayer.

Succeeding the performance was the Homily by Father Jack and the dispersal of ashes, performed by College Vice Captain, Hayden Cotter. The blessing of the Paschal candle, held by our other College Vice Captain Harry Coyne. followed, symbolising the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Continuing on from this was the blessing of the water. Led by boys from Year 12, students were blessed with holy water as a beautiful rendition of 'Gracefully Broken' was sung by Luke Vaccher (Year 12) and Ms Knapman. Finally, after blessings from Father Jack, Dr Lavorato addressed the gathered assembly. She spoke on the importance of faith and family during the Easter period, as well as giving an interesting and insightful take on the symbolism of the chocolate Easter egg.

The Holy Week Liturgy is one of the most anticipated events on the College Calendar, and the fact that this was the first whole school event on Breen Oval for quite a while, made it even more special.
















SUMMER SPORT SPLASH

It highlights again the importance of our Co-curricular life at the College and shows how it helps our boys navigate adolescence and mature into well balanced young men: our society's future leaders, husbands and fathers.

Our Prep H Basketball team consists predominantly of Year 5 students, and on this particular day we were playing a Scots team where their shortest player was about the height of our tallest player! Despite this, our boys played with skill and determination and were able to keep the scores reasonably level taking a one-point lead at half-time.

In the second half of the game, our boys were having to dig deep in order to compete against their taller opponents, and it was clear that this was taking it out of them. Still, they managed to hang in and even took a five-point lead before Scots used their height and skill to not only catch up but advance by another five points. The scoreboard was now sitting at 20-15 and it looked as though victory was imminent for Scots.

At this point, it would have been so easy for our boys to give in to their frustrations and give up, but I urged them on with the mantra 'even if we can't win, let's go down swinging!' With less than a minute before the final whistle, Scots restarted from the baseline and our boys were all over their opponents causing a turnover which we converted to two points. Scots restarted once again, but our boys put even more pressure on Scots and forced another turnover which we once again converted. With only 15 seconds on the clock, we were now only trailing by one point.

Excitement was mounting on the sidelines with parents cheering our boys on, and if I was on the court, I do not think I would have been able to maintain my composure. Not so for our boys; their tenaciousness paying off as they worked together to force an error from Scots causing an interception. With only two seconds to go, the ball was passed to teammate Joey (who had scored the last two baskets) to take the clutch shot and win the game!

At the final whistle, it felt like a scene from the movie *The Mighty Ducks*. Even though our boys celebrated by hugging and high fiving each other, they stopped to shake the hands of their opposition and congratulate them on a great game.

Hot on the heels of our First XI victory in the ISA Cricket Grand Final, this game was at the other end of the spectrum. Instead of our Year 12 boys representing the College for the last time, these junior students also demonstrated persistence, resilience, teamwork, and great sportsmanship. These values are something that in my short time here I have learned are the makings of a 'Pat's' boy.














On Sunday 16 April 1961, in front of a crowd of about 4,500, His Eminence Cardinal Gilroy blessed and opened the newly constructed College Chapel. It was a time of great rejoicing as this 'beautiful elliptical edifice' became part of our landscape and the spiritual heart of the College. Today, it not only stands as a monument of our faith, but also as a memorial dedicated to the 25 sons of the College who paid the supreme sacrifice in World War II.

The necessity of having our very own Chapel was something that then Headmaster Br Hodda and his predecessor Br McGlade had felt strongly about. It would not only put an end to over 30 years of traipsing down to St Martha's for the boys' weekly benediction, but would also provide a convenient place for our community of Brothers to lead their religious life. This need was Br Hodda's catalyst for launching an ambitious building program, one which was also to include a new three-storey residence for the Brothers and a 33 metre, six lane swimming pool.


As with all building projects, there were obstacles to be overcome in order to achieve success. The new Monastery and Chapel were to be built on the corner of Francis and Edgar Streets, nestled between the original school building and the 'Ark', a 50-year-old house in which the Brothers had previously resided.

These plans brought 'building lines' into question and much negotiation with Strathfield Council ensued. The unique design of the Chapel also raised some people's eyebrows, its oval shape the work of architect Kevin Curtain.

Upon its completion, the Chapel was declared a 'gem of architecture' in the Builders' Journal of that year. A beautiful mosaic of our patroness, Our Lady of Perpetual Help graced the top of the entrance steps and inside the ornate sandstone-faced Sanctuary complete with a spherical Tabernacle and marble altar, provided a striking focal point. It had a seating capacity of 500, six confessionals and was equipped with a Norwich-Miller English style electronic organ. Together with the Brothers' Monastery, the cost to complete the buildings amounted to 85,000 pounds which included funds donated from the Parents and Friends' Association.

For 60 glorious years, the Chapel has been the scene of countless Old Boy marriages, sombre farewells, graduations and liturgical celebrations. It is hard to imagine College life without the convenience of such a sacred place to gather together or to simply pop in for a quiet prayer. We are truly blessed.

Last term, we had the pleasure of welcoming Old Boy and Supreme Court Judge of the NSW Court of Appeal, The Honourable Justice Fabian Gleeson ('74) to the College. Justice Gleeson graciously gave of his time to talk to our Year 6 students about how the judicial system operates and more specifically, his role as a judge in the Court of Appeal.

As well as learning about this branch of government, the boys gained an insight into the court structure and the rights and liabilities of different parties in a legal action. The boys were fascinated as Justice Gleeson showed them his different robes and wigs and explained the significance of their colours and why they are worn at different occasions like criminal appeals and the swearing in of other judges. It was a wonderful experience for our boys to learn about the judicial system from a real-life judge rather than a TV show!

Justice Gleeson also reminisced with the boys about his time at SPC and in particular, his Rugby days. He showed off his well-loved number 8 jersey and recounted his final game on Breen Oval in 1974. It was against an extremely strong and undefeated St Augustine's side and Ted Healy was the Coach. Br Walsh captured the rough and gruelling game in his poem 'Black Sunrise' which was in the Lumen that year. Despite being on the verge of losing, the team showed resilience as Peter Conroy ran away and scored the winning try. Justice Gleeson explained that this sort of resilience is a characteristic instilled in the students at SPC.
