PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It has been a busy first semester at St Patrick's and now that COVID-19 is a distant memory, we have been able to enjoy an academic year without any interruptions. For example, I have experienced my first full Year 12 Graduation complete with rites of passage and the investiture of the Class of 2023 and new Student Leadership Team.

One of our key objectives for 2023 was to streamline our communication with parents and find a digital solution to sharing vital information with them. Our new TASS system has been refined and via the Parent Lounge, parents can access important documents, book interviews, update their address, medical and phone details and monitor their son's attendance. We will continue to work to make this software a bespoke product for our College.

The start of Term 4 sees the full implementation of our new St Patrick's College, Strathfield app. It can be freely downloaded from the Apple or Google store and our parents, staff and students can choose which information they wish to be alerted to. For example, you can tag Year 11 and Football if they are applicable to your son. It means you only get notified of information you wish to see. As the school day ends, students can check their phones as they leave to see any late information about training or activities, particularly useful if there is a sudden rainstorm or local parks are closed by Council.

This year we saw the return of Grandparents' Day. It was a wonderful morning and well attended by our grandparents. Grandparents play a very significant role in the development of young people that impacts them differently than a parent-child relationship, so it is important to foster this connection in ways that are accessible and safe for both. Not only are grandparents a source of wisdom for young children, but they also tend to introduce long standing family traditions and help formulate perceptions of healthy family dynamics. It was only one morning but it made a wonderful impact on our students. After all, it's not the quantity of time that matters, it's the quality which has given our young men a plethora of wisdom, learning and growth.

Another important social and religious fixture returned to the campus when we celebrated our fathers with our Fathers' Day Masses and morning tea. We very much appreciate the time taken out by fathers and grandfathers to attend. This celebration gave us reason to pause, to pray for, and to reflect on our fathers whom we honour. We celebrated, congratulated, and prayed for the men who continue to reflect the divine qualities of fatherhood as they lovingly establish, nourish, and maintain their families.

Our Class of 2022 have only just completed their HSC examinations. At their request, we moved the examinations away from the Hall to the Robson Auditorium, Duffy Music Centre and the Gymnasium so that we could minimise the noise from the building works. As these young men

move into the next stage of their lives, I ask the community to keep them in their prayers. In my address at the Graduation Assembly, I spoke to the gathering about new beginnings for Year 12. New beginnings, new journeys and definitely new challenges to explore!

As this publication goes to print, we are delighted to see the progress that has been made with our new Scientia Building. At present, windows are being installed, followed by the façade. Once at lock up stage, the internal fit-out of the spaces will commence. Given the rain events in 2022, we are about 35 days behind however, we should be able to occupy the building some time before the end of Term 1, 2023.



DEEP CONNECTIONS REALISED

On 19 June, ten Year 11 students and two staff members set off to Alice Springs to embark on our immersion. Throughout the eleven-day journey, we had one week with the fellas at the St Joseph's Flexible Learning Centre, and a three-day camping trip, which included seeing the sites of Uluru, Kata Tjuta and Kings Canyon through a new lens.

In the first week we immersed ourselves in a regular school day, developing our bonds with the fellas through AFL skills in a clinic and travelling to country, where the fellas taught us about

various Dreaming stories, and the significance of different sacred sites to their culture, including the Ochre Pit and Simpson's Gap. Despite us not sharing the same culture, it heightened our appreciation and connection towards the land and our nation. On Friday we witnessed and assisted in the three-hour process of setting up fire pits to cook kangaroo tails and enjoy them, which lived up to the high expectations set.

On Saturday we headed off on a 5-hour trip to our first camping site, near Uluru. Upon arrival, we had realised the pictures on postcards had deceived us - Uluru was much larger and more spectacular than we expected, taking a total of 4 hours to walk around the 10km perimeter. For the two nights we camped, we noted how polluted and lit up Sydney is, as the whole of the Milky Way was visible from our campsite. Over the next two days, we hiked the steep paths of Kata Tjuta and Kings Canyon, which both offered priceless views.

Overall, this awakening experience drew us closer to the fellas in Alice, our First Nations brothers, and ourselves as a group! Our connections deepened with the people of the Red Centre as well as the land, allowing each of us to grow more fully. I implore each of you reading this to not hesitate in taking the opportunity to embark on an immersion and to make the most of it, if given the chance!

A FEW GOOD MEN



PONDERING THE BIG QUESTIONS

Recently we saw the inaugural Philosopher in Residence program at the College, where we were fortunate to host Dr Tim Dean. Dr Dean is a philosopher, writer, and speaker who has a PhD in Philosophy from the University of NSW, where he researched the evolution of morality. He has been the Science and Technology Editor at The Conversation; and has edited Cosmos and Australian Life Scientist magazines. Dr Dean is an Honorary Associate in the Philosophy department at the University of Sydney and is the Chief Philosopher on the faculty of The School of Life, Sydney. He also is one of the Philosophers at the Ethics Centre.

Dr Dean challenged our students to think critically about areas such as equality and equity, truth and certainty, the ethics of genetic modification, the ethics of robotics, the limits of tolerance, what is art? and what is the good life? He worked with students across a range of different ages and his workshops were engaging and thought provoking, resulting in some very lively conversations. A huge thank you to the Parents' and Friends' Committee for their grant that made it possible for us to host Dr Dean. It proved to be a very rewarding opportunity for students and staff.

YEAR 9 FACE NEW CHALLENGES

In Week 3 of Term 4, the Year 9 cohort travelled to Camp Somerset, located along the Colo River for four days. Being the third year of going to Somerset, the boys already knew what awaited them, from canoeing down the Hawkesbury River (the Colo was flooded) to hiking up steep mountains. We also had the opportunity to complete activities like archery and the giant ladder to grow our connection with each other. This was a truly unforgettable experience that created memories and friendships for years to come.

Upon arrival at Camp Somerset, we were split into our camp groups. We were given rucksacks and packed all our stuff needed for four days, with a weight limit of 12kg, 3L being just water. Most groups started on a 4km hike to their first campsite. As it was remote, we carried 12L of water for 2km. This was our only water until we reached our next campsite. Once we arrived in the late afternoon, we set up our tents and had some rest time until dinner.

The next two days were spent hiking. On Tuesday we did our longest hike which was 14km with a 1km incline in the first 500m and on Wednesday we did a 12km hike scaling up and down two different mountains. These two days were the most difficult ones at camp and although some of us struggled, we all helped each other whenever we could. On the last day we did a 3km hike back to base camp where we had lunch with the rest of our cohort before returning to school by coach. Instead of hiking, some groups did two 8km canoeing on the Hawksbury River to the next campsite with all their gear.

The food we received differed exponentially from previous camps, notably with the introduction of rations. Each group was given a bag full of snacks, chocolate powder, cereal sachets and dehydrated food and the boys had the responsibility to use their rations wisely, otherwise they would run out of food for the remainder of their journey. We were also treated with food like canned beans and spaghetti, as well as other snacks like damper, made by the boys themselves. Dinners on other nights included nachos and sausages with pancakes and toast for breakfast.

Camp Somerset was a fun and enjoyable experience which took many of us outside of our comfort zones. We were eager to face new challenges like intense hiking, canoeing and team building exercises. Many boys established new friendships and overall, everyone enjoyed their final time at camp and would love to go back again if they got the chance.



Next year we will do it all again, and it will be bigger and better than before. I look forward to supporting and encouraging all the boys on their journey to get there.

Jack represented Australia as a member of the U18 Water Polo team. He wore the Green and Gold of Australia at the FINA Youth Men's World Championships, held in Belgrade, Serbia in August this year where his team placed 11th overall.

This championship is an imperative part of the Australian pathway programs as it opens avenues for the best young stars across the country to make as strong a case as possible for advancement toward full-time professional Super Rugby squads.

Mitchell Woods (Year 10)

As a member of the Sydney Swans AFL Academy this year, Mitchell was named in the 2022 AFL Under 16s All-Australian team. AFL great, Kevin Sheehan recently described Mitch as a "midfielder whose acceleration and power in bursts through the centre of the ground and away from stoppages was a real weapon in the Championships. He averaged 21.3 disposals (13 contested) 4.3 clearances and 4 tackles." A significant achievement for Mitchell which was made more special by being the only NSW player named in the national side.





BEING PART OF THE BIGGER STORY





The following is an extract of an address given by Old Boy and former College Vice Captain, Robert Johnson ('08). Earlier in the year, Robert was invited back to the College during a Staff Development Day to share his reminisces about his school years and the way in which his teachers impacted him. Robert's genuine and engaging nature served to highlight the importance of good teaching and the positive affect it can have on a young man's life.

"I was a student here from 2001-2008; my twin brothers Greg and Michael were here from 1992-1999. And I thought they were the coolest. I still think they're cool but less so. They were excellent students, College Prefects, Music Captain and Vice Captain, they did Debating, they were in Concert Band, Jazz Band, Musicals, Drama Productions, and they played Basketball and Rugby.

My earliest memories of this place are coming to their soirees in the original Duffy Music Centre in the mid-90s, and watching them play Rugby on No 2 Oval. So I knew this place through the experiences of my brothers. The way I just described them makes them sound like insufferable over-achievers, and they probably were but they never seemed that way to me. It didn't feel like they were weirdly over-involved, or too big for their boots, or showing off. Rather, it was just normal to be involved in the life of the school as deeply and passionately as they were. They were also 6'4" red-headed twins, so they stood out.

I arrived as a student in my blue cap and shorts on an extremely rainy morning in 2001: I was ready. I was going to walk in the big scary inspiring footsteps of my brothers. I was so convinced of my brothers' legacy that I was just waiting for them to be randomly brought up in conversation by teachers or older students. It's possible I was just a bit of a weird kid, but from day dot I had in my head that I was going to continue their story. I was going to be involved in the same things they were. I was extremely proud of them, and I'd observed how much satisfaction they got out of their lives here and wanted the same for myself.

I signed up for every co-curricular I could: Rugby, Cricket, Debating, Musical, Drama, Band. This culminated in being stood up at Assembly in Year 7 by Mr Fochesato, where he read out all of the co-curriculars I was doing and got everyone to clap. I found it extremely exciting and validating, but I was a big nerd who was following my brothers' story. What I hadn't realised yet was how much support and encouragement I was

going to receive from my teachers and peers. I was glad and sort of mystified when I realised that somehow this co-curricular thing was cool and I was receiving positive recognition for it.

For me, one of the pillars of SPC is a culture of getting amongst it, and that doesn't necessarily mean succeeding with flying colours or winning at all costs. Some things stick, and some don't. But you try. I played four seasons of Cricket and finished with 2 wickets, a few flukey catches and a high score of 11. Though I will add that that 11 was match-saving and featured two glorious boundaries. I also spent the first half of Year 11 trying to make it as an Advanced Mathematics student. When I made the decision to drop Maths entirely for the HSC, my teacher Mr Burns, who was famously a man of few words, simply said: "I think that would be wise." It was the happiest day of my life.

When I was in Year 12, I was honoured to place first in the State in the NSW Schools Writing Competition, which I was very chuffed about. The main thing that sticks in my mind is my















conversation with Mr Hirst, my English teacher who told me I had placed first, shook my hand and said "Congratulations, you deserve it." I continue to write; I've written for the stage, I've published short stories, and of all my experiences professionally as a writer, that interaction is still something I think about. That stuff sticks.

Another big highlight and a glimpse of things to come was in Year 7 religion, when we were given a group assignment to provide a brief history of Edmund Rice. Most groups did posters or short speeches, but I took it upon myself to write a 20-minute play featuring a time-traveling Edmund Rice (played by me) who took the other group members on a journey through history to all of the major points in his life. My uncle had briefly trained to be a priest, so I borrowed his old cassock and folded up paper to be a collar and did an outrageous Irish accent. It was pretty over the top, but we were a hit. While unnecessarily long and not always historically accurate, the fact my group had done something unapologetically different was celebrated. My teacher Mr O'Donnell told me afterwards that it was the best fake Irish accent he'd ever heard, which is on my CV actually.

What I loved about being here is that there were opportunities to express yourself, and that those who expressed themselves were commended for it. I felt at my freest here when I was being encouraged to be myself.

Ms Daley is case in point when it comes to inspirational teachers. She was my religion

teacher in Year 8 and is one of the best teachers I've ever had. One of the things that made her one of my favourite teachers was her clear passion for what she was teaching. She was energised and excited about what she was teaching, and that captured my imagination as well, even if she wasn't always convinced that that was the case. She also recruited me back into the Night Patrol fold in 2016, so her influence is wide-reaching.

One of our topics for HSC religion was Peace, and one of the concepts was Inner Peace. An idea that struck me then, but continues to gain more and more meaning for me, was that if every person on earth was able to find peace within themselves, there would be world peace. I thought that was deeply profound. I still bring that concept up to Ms Daley sometimes, usually as a joke even though I don't think it's silly at all - classic deflection. And I'm in danger of drawing far too long a bow here, but that idea of each individual contributing their very particular personal element to the benefit of a larger culture also applies to that powerful, supportive sense of community that I've been talking about. I also feel like I've given an analogy for communism but that wasn't my intention.

So what is my point? That's a good question. I'm 31, I graduated 14 years ago, but my experience as a student here is still one I walk around with and refer back to. What I learnt about community, following your passions, and working hard, but not even in a weird clichéd Dead Poets Society

way - they were lessons I picked up indirectly, just by being involved. Just by responding pretty naturally to the opportunities that were presented to me. This was never a place where you would expect to be shut down if you were passionate about something, and that is still how I live my life. I studied to be a journalist, then switched to acting, and am currently seriously considering taking the rest of the year off to work on my own writing project - that might sound crazy, or like I've made a series of increasingly ill-informed career choices, but what I see when I look at that trajectory is that most times when I come to a hinge point in my life and am feeling pulled in a certain direction, I tend to follow it. And I genuinely don't believe that would be as strong an instinct for me if it hadn't been so nurtured by the teachers and the community of St Pat's.

So 14 years have passed, the students are different, a lot of the staff is different, the world is different, but I think there would still be a lot of boys here who are living in their own bigger stories like I was, hoping to tap into some small part of the legacy of this place like I was, and who will go forward in their lives but carry that magic whatever-it-is with them. And maybe come back and try to make a point of it to a group of teachers years later. I'm really grateful for this place and the passionate people who make it what it is, and you are all part of that, and I hope you think that's pretty cool. Because it is. What you're doing really matters."

program just over a year ago and has now guided a squad who were labelled "a bunch of misfits" to winning the World Series Sevens tournament for the first time in its 23-year-old history!

After a breakout season playing Cricket in Tasmania. John's son Harry Manenti ('18) was awarded Tasmanian Player of the Year for the 2021/22 season. His highlight was a rare feat of

100 runs and 10 wickets in the same match. During the European summer, Harry was selected in the Italian National Team and played six T20 internationals and five One Day internationals. Harry scored a Century in an inaugural victory over Hong Kong for the Italians.

Not to be outdone, Harry's older brother Ben Manenti ('14) made his One Day Cup debut for South Australia. Batting with the tail, Ben top scored with 60 runs off 45 balls and claimed two wickets including that of current test opening batsman, Usman Khawaja. Ben's efforts saw him awarded Man of the Match for his performance. Following this, Ben made his first-class debut for South Australia v Tasmania in the Sheffield Shield Match at Adelaide Oval. During the match he fought hard to keep his side in the game with scores of 59 runs in the first innings and 85 not out in the second. Ben also claimed two wickets in the first

innings, one of those being former Australian Captain, Tim Paine and a further wicket in the second innings. Unfortunately, Ben's 144 runs weren't enough for South Australia to win the game, but he becomes one of only a handful of players to score a half century in both innings of their Shield Debut. According to the record books, Ben is also our first official First-Class cricketer since Ernie Crossan ('33).

In years to come no doubt we will hear more about the exploits of this sporting family, especially given that John's youngest son, Louis Manenti has just graduated from SPC. As a player in the First XI Cricket team, Louis has proven to be a handy spin bowler and strong with the bat. Louis is now coaching Cricket at the College as he pursues a Rugby career after a successful season playing in the First XV. Watch this space!

OLD BOYSGIVE BACK



Determined not to let this hold him back, Augustine pursued his dream to become a footballer and represents Australia as a Pararoo (Australian Football team for athletes with cerebral palsy, acquired brain injury or symptoms acquired from a stroke). No doubt sharing his story helped inspire Nicholas to achieve his own goals, whatever they may be.

MONS. JOHN USHER CELEBRATES MILESTONE

We congratulate Mons. John Usher ('57) who recently celebrated his 50th Jubilee of priestly ordination as a Sydney Archdiocesan priest.


After graduating from SPC in 1957, Mons. Usher pursued tertiary studies in commerce and accounting. At the age of 25 however, he decided on a career change and entered the seminary in Springwood and Manly before being ordained in 1972. A couple of years later, the Archbishop of Sydney, Cardinal Freeman, persuaded Mons. Usher to return to university and undertake further studies in Social Work.

In 1999, Mons. Usher was appointed Director of Centacare (Catholic Care), a position he held for 25 years. On retiring from Centacare, he spent 33 years at St Patrick's Parish, Mortlake and, at the same time, became the Chancellor of the Archdiocese of Sydney. Mons. Usher's skills in social welfare were recognised by the NSW Government when appointed in August 1991 as Chairman of a Ministerial Review Committee dealing with children in long term institutional residential care.

In 2003, the College recognised Mons. Usher's achievements and awarded him with the Luceat Award. Upon accepting the award, Mons. Usher said "It was the relationship between the values of home and the values of the Catholic education of this College that provided me with the most important preparation for life in my case. In fact, it was basically a spiritual preparation. It was an experience of God." A year later, Mons. Usher received an OAM and in 2009, became a Prelate of Honour.

In recognition of his 50th Jubilee, the St Patrick's parish newsletter said the following about Mons. Usher; "he was best known as a good bloke who could engage with all people, young and old, rich and poor. As Parish Priest of Mortlake, he exercised his pastoral ministry with love, great care, and diligence. His love of life and people, together with his strong sense of social justice and inclusion made him a friend and priest to all."

By all accounts, Mons. John Usher is a man of kindness who continues to let his light shine brightly.
