





PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As we move towards the end of the year, much has been achieved by the students and staff of St Patrick's College.

In our Strategic Plan, we state our goal of continuing to offer the boys 'Opportunities – Creating a positive inclusive culture by offering many opportunities for our students to engage in.' I am delighted to report that many exciting opportunities were there for our students and they took to them with great gusto.

In the Co-curricular (Cultural) domain, the Performing Arts provided several wonderful opportunities to showcase talent. There was a very successful production of *Shakespeare in Love*, the Performing Arts Showcase, Band Camp and we participated in the NSW Band Championships.

We celebrated our best-ever CSDA debating season. In the Grand Finals, Year 11 and Year 9 finished as runners-up, and Year 8 secured victory against Our Lady of the Sacred Heart College Kensington. In a field of 62 schools, to have the top teams across different age groups is remarkable. My proudest moment was when we secured both the Junior and Senior school divisions' prestigious Aggregate Shields. This remarkable achievement underlines our students' dedication and our excellent coaches' guidance.

The College also enjoyed a great Winter Sports Season, with success in different codes which saw a number of teams playing in the finals. For the second year in a row, the First XI Football team won the ISA Finals over at the Wanderers Complex in Blacktown and the First XV Rugby finished in the top three schools in the ISA. This augurs well for the 2024 season!

The College is committed to reestablishing its raft of intentional formation activities. During the break between Terms 2 and 3, we were proud to have students attend an immersion to Alice Springs, the World Youth Day pilgrimage in Lisbon and an immersion to Papua New Guinea. The feedback from the boys afforded these opportunities has been overwhelmingly positive, with some reporting that the experiences have changed their lives. This term, our Year 9 Drama students have struck up an online relationship with an EREA school in Sierra Leone. The boys hope to visit one day but, in the meantime, they are getting to know each other and find out all the things they have in common. These activities further highlight our strategic goal, 'Global and Local Engagement,' as we seek to provide opportunities for our boys to learn about, and connect with, other communities.

The opening of the Scientia Building has allowed us to achieve our 'Learning' goal, set out in our Strategic Plan. For 'Learning,' we are committed

to reviewing curriculum offerings so that we improve student engagement. In addition to having wonderful, state-of-the-art facilities for science, it has been a delight to see our boys undertaking studies in Food Technology (Year 9) and Hospitality (Year 11). Not only this, but Year 7 students have been undertaking 'Food and Agriculture' as a context area in Technology Mandatory. The official Blessing and Opening of the building is scheduled for late November, and we are delighted to announce that our special guest will be Professor John Mattick AO ('67), an esteemed Old Boy and recipient of the 2014 Luceat Award. Having a globally acclaimed scientist inaugurate our science labs is extremely fitting, and a huge honour.

It has also been a great semester for strengthening our strong community links. In recent months we have hosted Grandparents Day, Father's Day Masses and Back to Breen Day. The latter was attended by a strong number of Old Boys who also took the opportunity to visit our new Science and Hospitality facilities.

Finally, we had the bittersweet task of saying farewell to the Class of 2023. Bittersweet because we will miss them and at the same time, we are so proud of them as they move into the world. In my address at the Graduation Assembly, I quoted one of Robert Frost's poems: "I took the one less travelled by, And that has made all the difference." Frost's poem beautifully illustrates how our daily choices, no matter how small, can profoundly shape our lives. We encouraged our graduates to shine their light, tread the path less travelled which aligns with their Christian values, and in doing so, find their true purpose, impacting others positively. We are eagerly anticipating their HSC results and are immensely proud of the impressive practical projects they created in Visual Arts, Industrial Technology (Timber) and Design and Technology. The Drama and Music students dedicated themselves to delivering exceptional performances, with Bailey Yeates earning an Encore nomination for his performance in Music 2.

The collaborative efforts of our teachers and students, exemplify our commitment to being 'A Beacon for Boys' Education.' Our students have not only excelled academically but have also contributed to our community by sharing their spiritual, emotional, athletic, cultural and academic talents. They stand as a source of inspiration, illuminating our community from within.

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EMPATHY FOR THE HOMELESS

On Friday 21 July, the annual Winter Sleepout took place at the College. For the first time, I participated, and it was heartening to see more than 200 students and staff volunteering for this meaningful experience.

The evening commenced with a presentation by some of the students in FIAT, educating us about the harsh realities of homelessness in Australia and worldwide. We heard shocking statistics and saw compelling interviews that underscored the importance of our participation in this event. One statistic that left a lasting impact, was the revelation that over 17,000 children under the age of 12 experienced homelessness on Census night in 2021. This jarring fact reshaped our perceptions and highlighted how close to home this issue truly is.

Following the presentation, all participants were served a modest dinner of soup and a bread roll. This meal aimed to replicate what an average night for a homeless person might be like, where they rely on food from shelters or kitchens. After dinner, we focused on assembling care packages which would be distributed nationwide to families in need.


It was inspiring to witness the enthusiasm and teamwork among the students, and we managed to complete the packing faster than ever before. All packages were sent to St Vincent De Paul, along with over \$6,000 raised by those in attendance.

Before retiring for the night, Year 12 students led discussions on various aspects of homelessness, pondering our role in finding a solution and considering how homelessness fits into the broader social justice landscape. It was particularly encouraging to hear younger voices share their perspectives and explore the collective impact our community could have.

Sleeping with only cardboard and sleeping bags, we all felt the chill of the night, offering us a glimpse into the daily struggles experienced by countless individuals worldwide. When we awoke the next day we had tired eyes, but more importantly, a newfound gratitude and a deeper sense of empathy for the 122,000 Australians who have no place to call home.

A JOURNEY OF DISCOVERY

In mid-June, guided by Mr Herro and Mr Van Der Meer, a group of young men embarked on a journey from Sydney to Alice Springs for the annual Alice Springs Immersion. Our mission was to strengthen our school's connection with the St Joseph's Flexible Learning Centre, engage with the local Indigenous community and gain a profound understanding of their culture and beliefs.

During the main week of the immersion, we attended school with the students at St Joseph's and ventured out into the Indigenous community to learn about the Dreaming stories of the Arrernte people and immerse ourselves in their culture. For instance, we gathered and processed bush medicine, discovering its traditional uses for treating various ailments. We also prepared and savoured traditional Aboriginal food like kangaroo tails and unique fruits found in the bush. Learning how Indigenous people lived off the land was a fascinating lesson in sustainability and respect for the environment.

A memorable experience was our journey alongside the Caterpillar, a mountain range encircling Mparntwe with deep Dreamtime roots. We stopped at culturally significant sites like the Clay Pans, Corroboree Rock, Emily, Simpsons and Jessie gaps, and Ormiston Gorge. Here, we marvelled at ancient cave artworks and for some, even swam in the river. The fellas' respect for their culture and eagerness to educate us left a lasting impression, making it difficult to say goodbye.

For the rest of the immersion, we camped closer to some significant cultural sites, touring Uluru and learning about this natural wonder. We watched the colours of Uluru shift at sunset and explored Kata Tjuta and Kings Canyon, both breathtaking and vital to the Pitjantjatjara peoples. Camping under the stars, sharing stories and eating smores by the campfire is an experience I will never forget.

The Alice Springs Immersion transformed us, deepening our connection to Indigenous culture, fostering an appreciation for the land and forging meaningful relationships. We extend our gratitude to Mr Herro and Mr Van Der Meer for guiding and challenging us throughout this incredible journey.


















THE LAND OF THE UNEXPECTED

In Papua New Guinea, a land adorned with over 850 languages and approximately 1,000 distinct cultures, diversity thrives. Despite a taxing 36-hour journey marred by multiple delays and an impromptu overnight stay in an airport hotel, relief and excitement washed over us as we finally landed in Tokua (Rabaul) in the East New Britain province.

Papua New Guinea, often dubbed 'The Land of the Unexpected,' was a phrase Mr Viney reiterated throughout our adventure. The sense of gratitude was palpable as we met Br Bernard White and his students from the Edmund Rice Life Training Centre at Vuvu for the first time. His words resonated deeply: "Blessed Edmund Rice is a guiding light follow the light in your life, not the darkness."

Our journey commenced with a day of work on the poultry farm, followed by joining the Vuvu boys in the coconut plantation. Playful chaos erupted during a spontaneous coconut fight initiated by Michael Sakr, with Ms Rocca inadvertently caught in the crossfire. Mornings brought gratitude prayers in the Chapel, while afternoons were filled with laughter at the beach, touch football, communal meals, heated card games and debriefs led by Ms Rocca.

During our immersion, we attended war memorial services, such as a visit to Rabaul (Bita Paka) War Cemetery, where we learned about Australia's involvement in WWII. Mr Menck vividly described Rabaul's history as the 'jewel of the Pacific' before the devastating '94 volcano eruption. The arduous climb up Mt Mother afforded us breathtaking views and a profound sense of the beauty surrounding us. Meeting Dame Sanra Lau, a close friend of Mr Viney, was an impactful experience. Her outpouring of love and generosity resonated deeply, leaving an indelible mark on all of us. A special mention goes to Christopher Gittani and Joel Hallifax for their show stopping karaoke skills that night!

As we prepared to leave, Luke Bromfield aptly captured our shared sentiment: "We hear so many stories about PNG, but to see it firsthand is truly inspirational." This immersion reminded us that communities built on cultural diversity foster contentment, fulfillment, and inclusion. Our connections with the Vuvu boys illustrate the power of shared experiences, with the relationships formed among the SPC students holding a special place in our hearts. We hope these bonds remain unbroken. We encourage all staff and students to consider embarking on their own immersion journey in the future; it will undoubtedly be an experience of a lifetime.






WINTER SPORT WRAP-UP

The 2023 Winter Sports Season has ended, allowing us to celebrate some great achievements in various sports.

In ISA Tennis, our students demonstrated commitment, sportsmanship and skill, with significant successes across different age groups. The Division 7 team's Grand Final victory crowned them ISA Premiers. The promising performance of our Junior players bodes well for the future. Notably, Lucas Martin and Nikolai Kayrouz earned ISA Representative selections, reflecting our tennis talent.









In Football, our teams shone. The 13 As became undefeated ISA Premiers, scoring 92 goals while conceding just seven. The 14 Cs were undefeated, securing the Premiership with 54 goals and two conceded and the 16 Cs went through the season without conceding a single goal. The Second XI became undefeated ISA Premiers, and the First XI won their ISA Grand Final in a thrilling penalty shootout against Oakhill College.

Several students received recognition in Football, with 10 players selected to represent in the ISA competition. A special mention must be made of Alessandro Romeo and Joseph Hatem who each earned spots in the NSW CIS team. Alessandro made history by also being selected in the NSW Schoolboys team, the first in 26 years.

The Rugby season unfolded with 18 teams taking to the field. Special commendations were awarded to the 14 B team for their outstanding performance as ISA Runners Up. Ten students represented the College at ISA level. The First XV's impressive 55-17 win against St Stanislaus' College was a highlight as was the electrifying atmosphere of Back to Breen Day when the Old Boys gathered to support the First XV in their bid for the ISA Division One Rugby Shield. Although victory eluded them, the spirit and pride on display was fantastic.









Athletics showcased significant improvement, with several personal bests. St Patrick's College finished third in the Junior, Senior and Aggregate competitions.

This season has illustrated the dedication and talent of our athletes. Their commitment and sportsmanship make us proud and we anticipate the challenges and triumphs of the upcoming season.

Effective communication and the capacity to engage with an audience are fundamental attributes of a successful commentator. Both Luke and Patrick possess these qualities in abundance, and it's truly exciting to learn that they've carved a niche for themselves in this fiercely competitive field. I had the privilege of catching up with these young men and delve into their school experiences and discover how they ventured onto the Rugby sidelines, assuming the role of game commentators.

LUKE BARRY-DONNELLAN ('08)

My journey at SPC, both as a student and staff member, has been an amazing experience, gifting me with numerous life lessons and cherished memories.

In terms of personal growth and character development, my experience playing Rugby at the College played a pivotal role and fostered friendships that I continue to cherish. Participating in the Prep A Canberra Tour in 2002 stands out as a significant memory, marking the early stages of my commentary career. Wearing the black jersey in 2008 as part of the First XV, especially alongside some of my closest friends, remains a golden highlight.

SPC was home to many influential teachers. Mr Andrew Gillies had immense faith in my abilities as a junior, guiding me throughout my time at the College. Mr Bruce Hopkins and Mr Mark Newbury ignited my passion for teaching while Mr Rob Simpson was a constant

source of support during my formative years. From a rugby perspective, Mr Paul Hardwick's guidance while in the First XV instilled confidence in my abilities as a player, which was pivotal to my post-school career and my journey in commentary.

Initially I lacked clarity about my aspirations post SPC. Broadcast media seemed limited to print, radio, and television at the time, and I questioned if I had what it took to succeed in this field. Consequently, I studied Exercise Science at ACU Strathfield, but deferred for a semester due to uncertainty. With advice from a family member, I persevered and completed my degree, along with a Diploma of Education, allowing me to become a PDHPE teacher. I spent half a year working in the Junior School at SPC and then joined Parramatta Marist High School, where I've served as a PDHPE Teacher and Year Coordinator for seven years.



My journey into broadcasting, particularly game-calling was a long-held dream. I admired iconic commentators like Ray Warren, Gordon Bray, and Warren Smith. Before school, I would meticulously gather statistics and players' names from rugby magazines. I loved imitating my commentary heroes, reciting their famous moments in the playground to the amusement of students and teachers.

My commentary journey began while playing for West Harbour. When substituted, I would rush to

the ground announcer's microphone, commenting on the rest of the match. This habit continued at St Patrick's Rugby Club, where I started calling games on YouTube during the infancy of online streaming, all from the bench. I was even excited to announce my entry onto the field!

My broadcasting career took a more serious turn when I had the chance to call games for the Newtown Jets through an online radio company. This opportunity arose through a conversation on Facebook, providing me with the basic skills to call play-by-play. The online streaming industry gained momentum, especially during the first wave of COVID-19, leading to opportunities to broadcast community sports. Three years later, and with determination, I now serve as the lead commentator for the Shute Shield with Stan Sport and 9Gem.

To the boys of today, I want to stress that I am incredibly fortunate to call Rugby and make a living from it. However, my journey wouldn't have been possible without the relationships formed at SPC and through Rugby. My school and the Rugby Club have played a pivotal role in my current position. Rugby is a sport that brings people together, creating a unique sense of community. I've always felt like part of a larger family.

For the boys at the College aspiring to enter broadcasting, I advise you to practice and develop your skills. Seize every opportunity to learn and get involved. The online streaming sports industry is expanding, and there are ample opportunities. Invest in broadening your vocabulary; as a commentator, you are a storyteller.
